





Skating Program for Grade 3—6 students December 4-19

BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS



Community Consultations

As part of its strategic plan and evaluation, the Board indicated its desire to hold community consultations. The intent is to promote engagement and gather feedback from parents and community stakeholders on educational issues. This initiative will be done in consultation with Division leadership. The Board approved a motion to create a community consultation committee that will be a committee of the whole.

ATA Agreement:

The Board and teachers have ratified local terms for a new collective agreement.

2024-25 School Calendar

The Division is in the early stages of creating the 2024-25 learning calendar. Planning will follow a similar process as last year and incorporate feedback from staff, parents and other community stakeholders.

SchoolMessenger

We are in the early stages of phase one of SchoolMessenger implementation across the Division. This communication tool will allow schools to send notifications to families via phone, text and email. Parents have been invited to opt-in or out of receiving text messages. Phase two of SchoolMessenger implementation will include activating the attendance reporting feature, Safe Arrival, and is expected to begin early in 2024.

2022 Scholarship Program

A video will soon be released recognizing our Local Scholarship Recipients for our division-wide scholarship program. We recognize the hard work and accomplishments of our students and would also like to thank all of our local scholarship sponsors for supporting our students.

Local Authorities Election Act Review

Financial Report

The transition to a new insurance provider has been finalized with the new policy year starting November 1. The Division is pleased to report that the premiums have gone down significantly and will result in a positive budget adjustment of \$350.000.

The Province announced additional Learning Disruption grant funding which is intended to provide targeted programming in literacy and numeracy for the remainder of this school year. The Division will be receiving \$64,125.

The Board will review the year-end audit on November 23, 2023. Two public members are still being sought for the audit committee.

Myrnam Community Library

Northern Lights Library System (NLLS) has served notice that they will cease operating the municipal library located in New Myrnam School effective December 22, 2023. The Board is hopeful that community and municipal stakeholders can find a solution to keep the program in operation.

Minister of Education Visit

SPERD representatives had an opportunity to meet with Minister Demetrios Nicolaides on October 12.

HOW SICK IS TOO SICK FOR SCHOOL?



SEND TO SCHOOL

- A runny nose or just a little cough but no other symptoms.
- Sore throat but no other symptoms.
- No fever in the past 24 hours without fever-reducing medicine.
- No vomiting or diarrhea for 24 hours.



KEEP AT HOME

- Fever higher than 100.4 degrees F (38 degrees C).
- Sore throat, with other symptoms such as a persistent cough.
- Vomiting or diarrhea in the past 24 hours.
- Eyes are pink and crusty.
- Has been exposed to an illness where isolation is recommended.









EXTREME WEATHER

Is my child's bus running? Coming home early?

Throughout the winter, weather and road conditions are constantly monitored with the safety of students and staff at the center of all of our decisions. We strive to inform parents of any delays or cancellations as quickly as possible. Here's how you may be notified:

- Bus driver contact
- Call/text from your school
- Local radio stations
- Bus Status app

- Division social media (Facebook and Instagram)
- Division website https://www.stpauleducation.ab.ca/transportation/bus-status



How we decide:

When temperatures and/or wind chill is -40 or colder, buses are CANCELLED.


Notice may be given the night before or in the morning.



Buses may run in the afternoon during extreme cold weather under certain circumstances.



Weather checks start very early with The Weather Network and phone calls to designated staff living in each local area.



- If your child attends: meaningful learning still occurs
- If your child is absent: efforts will be made to ensure they do not fall behind



If a decision is required around temperature and/or road conditions, the Director of Transportation consults with:

- Local bus drivers
- School principals
- Superintendent of Schools



Decision is based on:

- Local road conditions
- · RCMP travel advisories
- · Weather and wind warnings
- Local municipality

Your bus driver also has complete discretion to cancel a route should they feel travel is unsafe.



Parents always have the final say about their child's safety and well-being and can always choose whether or not to have their child take the bus.





EMERGENCY PROTOCOLS

Information for Parents

LOCKDOWN

- There is an immediate THREAT OF VIOLENCE to students and staff INSIDE the school building.
- Objective of a Lockdown is to protect the safety of people by getting them behind locked doors.
- Students and staff placed into secure areas and school will not operate as normal inside the building.
- No one allowed in or out of the school.
- Lockdown ends when Person in Command on-site issues the ALL CLEAR.
- Doors are unlocked by Person in Command or the police.

In the event of a Lockdown it may not always be possible to send out information until after the incident has ended.

Parents will be notified and kept informed (as soon as it is safe to do so) should this protocol be initiated.

Parent Do's:

- Please rest assured school officials are doing their best to ensure your child's safety.
- Please await information via school/division websites and social media.

Parent Don'ts:

- Don't call or text your child during an emergency situation as ringtones and vibrations make your child's whereabouts known to possible aggressors.
- Don't rush to the school. Additional interference makes it difficult for police/authorities to do their jobs.

HOLD AND SECURE

- There is an emergency situation in close proximity to the school, outside the school, on the school grounds and/or unrelated to the school.
- All exterior doors to the school are locked.
- School operates as normal, inside the school walls.
- Outdoor activities, field trips, etc. are cancelled.
- Access to and from the school is restricted and carefully monitored.
- Hold and Secure ends when Person in Command issues the ALL CLEAR.

Parents will be notified when the protocol is initiated and kept updated via school and division websites and social media accounts.

Parent Do's:

- Please rest assured school officials are doing their best to ensure your child's safety.
- Please await information via school/division websites and social media.

Parent Don'ts:

- Don't call or text your child during an emergency situation so classes can proceed as usual. Calls and texts are disruptive and, if circumstances change, can interfere with teacher communication with students.
- Don't rush to the school. Additional interference makes it difficult for police/authorities to do their jobs.

SHELTER IN PLACE

- There is an ENVIRONMENTAL emergency in close proximity to the school, outside the school, on the school grounds and/or unrelated to the school. Examples can include; dangerous goods spill, wildlife on the playground, tornado, etc.
- If the threat is immediate, students and staff will be gathered into safer spaces, such as away from outside walls and large vented areas.
- Access to and from the school will depend on the ENVIRONMENTAL emergency.
- The protocol will continue until Person in Command issues ALL CLEAR.

Parents will be notified and kept informed (as soon as it is safe to do so) should this protocol be initiated.

Parent Do's:

- Please rest assured school officials are doing their best to ensure your child's safety.
- Please await information via school/division websites and social media.

Parent Don'ts:

- Don't call or text your child during an emergency situation. Calls and texts are disruptive and, if circumstances change, can interfere with teacher communication with students.
- Don't rush to the school. Additional interference makes it difficult for police/authorities to do their jobs.

CLASSROOM HOLD

- There is a situation happening inside the school that does not meet the requirement for a Lockdown/Hold and Secure/Shelter in Place but does require action to temporarily keep students in the classroom. Examples may include keeping traffic out of the hallways in the event of a medical situation or an RCMP investigation or arrest.
- Students are kept in the classroom to protect the integrity of the person(s) involved.
- Parents will not likely be notified of a Classroom Hold.

EMERGENCY EVACUATION

- There is possible danger INSIDE the school. Examples can include fire, chemical spill, gas leak, etc.
- Students escorted by staff to a safe location away from the school.
- No one will re-enter the school until Person in Command issues the ALL CLEAR.

Parents will be notified and kept informed (as soon as it is safe to do so) should this protocol be initiated.

Parent Do's:

- Please rest assured school officials are doing their best to ensure your child's safety.
- Please wait information via school/division websites and social media.

Parent Don'ts:

- Don't call or text your child during an emergency situation. Calls and texts are disruptive and, if circumstances change, can interfere with teacher communication with students.
- Don't rush to the school. Additional interference makes it difficult for police/authorities to do their jobs.


Important Note Regarding Bussing and all After School Events

Depending on the nature of the situation:

- Morning and after school bussing may be interrupted.
- After school sporting events, practices, clubs, etc may be interrupted/delayed/cancelled.
- Parents will be notified as soon as possible.

Addiction & Mental Health News



Seasonal Affective Disorder or SAD occurs in up to 17% of people, and often is seen in more than 1 family member. It is a type of depression that usually happens in the colder months, when the days are shorter.

Winter blues impacts about 15% of Canadians and involves a lower mood or waves of emotions in the colder months.

These tend to be more common in adults, but can still show up in children and youth. It you see signs in yourself or your children, speak to a healthcare provider.

Ways to combat "winter blues" as a family

- Watch a funny show or movie together; make a night of it!
- Put on your favourite music and have a dance party
- Make a winter bucket list, come up with some activities the whole family is interested in
- Try new recipes
- Create new family traditions
- Have conversations and check in with each other if you notice any changes in behaviour

Ways to combat "winter blues"

If you notice your children have lower moods in the winter, there are some strategies that may

- Open curtains and allow natural light in
- Spend time outdoors and get fresh air
- Get regular exercise and eat healthy
- Talk to a doctor or a therapist
- Ask your doctor or pharmacist about vitamin D supplements
- Help your child understand what increases their stress and how they can better manage it

Stress Busters

Stress can impact your overall mood and wellbeing. If you notice yours or your children's moods are fluctuating in the cold winter months, you may need to take extra special care. This could include things like:

- Deep breathing strategies
- Try "mindful crafts" or "stress reduction crafts for kids"
- Mindfulness strategies like focusing on your 5 senses (5 things you see, 4 things you touch, 3 things you hear, 2 things you smell, 1 think you taste)
















Elk Point LOCATION 2023
