
WINTER WALK DAY - WEDNESDAY, FEB. 7th


We would like extend an invite to all our EPE family members to come out and join us on our Winter Walk Day on February 7th at 12:38pm after noon recess. Hope to see you there!


News from the Learning Commons

HOW SICK IS TOO SICK FOR SCHOOL?



SEND TO SCHOOL

- A runny nose or just a little cough but no other symptoms.
- Sore throat but no other symptoms.
- No fever in the past 24 hours without fever-reducing medicine.
- No vomiting or diarrhea for 24 hours.



KEEP AT HOME

- Fever higher than 100.4 degrees F (38 degrees C).
- Sore throat, with other symptoms such as a persistent cough.
- Vomiting or diarrhea in the past 24 hours.
- Eyes are pink and crusty.
- Has been exposed to an illness where isolation is recommended.







EXTREME WEATHER Is my child's bus running? Coming home early?

Throughout the winter, weather and road conditions are constantly monitored with the safety of students and staff at the center of all of our decisions. We strive to inform parents of any delays or cancellations as quickly as possible. Here's how you may be notified:

How we decide:


When temperatures and/or wind chill is -40 or colder, buses are CANCELLED. Notice may be given the night before or in the morning.

-40°C

Buses may run in the afternoon during extreme cold weather under certain circumstances. Weather checks start very early with The Weather Network and phone calls to designated staff living in each local area.

Even if buses are cancelled schools remain **OPEN**.

- If your child attends: meaningful learning still occurs
- If your child is absent: efforts will be made to ensure they do not fall behind



- Local road conditions
- RCMP travel advisories
- Weather and wind warnings
- Local municipality

Your bus driver also has complete discretion to cancel a route should they feel travel is unsafe.



If a decision is required around temperature and/or road conditions, the Director of Transportation consults with:

- Local bus drivers
- School principals
- Superintendent of Schools

Parents always have the final say about their child's safety and well-being and can always choose whether or not to have their child take the bus.

The Nations of Saddle Lake, Whitefish Lake and Frog Lake make independent decisions about their buses. Please contact them directly for any questions regarding their transportation policies.

December 13, 2023 BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS



Alberta Education Results Report (AERR)

Trustees passed a motion to approve the Division's Annual Education Results Report. This annual document provides an overview of our progress in advancing the Division's educational priorities and those of the province. The results highlighted in our AERR are used to identify the Division's goals, outcomes and strategies within the annual Education Plan. The full document can be found on our division <u>website</u>.

Research Grant Proposal

The Division is currently participating in research with Grant MacEwan University to promote pathways to postsecondary education for Indigenous students. To continue this work, the Division is pursuing an additional grant opportunity from the federal government. The Board approved a motion supporting the Division's application for the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) grant. If successful, the funding will support the Division in working with other partners to identify common learnings and promising practices in education.

2024-25 School Calendar

Trustees reviewed two draft calendars. Calendar A is very similar to the 2023-24 calendar. Calendar B has a full week break in November. Trustees passed a motion to circulate the calendars for feedback in January.

Community Consultations

The Board will begin phase one of the community consultation process by reaching out to parents and school communities. Municipalities will be included in phase two.

Financial Report

Secretary-Treasurer Champagne summarized the results of the 2022-23 audited financial statements approved at the November 23, 2023 meeting. The Division incurred a deficit of \$617,136. This was better than the budgeted deficit of \$1,093,027 and an improvement over the previous year's deficit of \$1,795,306. Division reserves have been drawn down to minimum levels, and the Division needs to continue to align expenses with revenues which are a function of enrolment. Financial statements are posted on the Division's website.

Mallaig School Design

The design committee has explored numerous options and has now settled on a draft schematic layout. The Division is also collaborating with the County of St. Paul to assess the demand for childcare in the Mallaig area and identify a suitable operator. Childcare falls outside the K-12 education mandate, and the Division is actively engaging with various stakeholders to explore viable options.

Family School Liaison Worker Program

Thank you to the Two Hills FCSS and the County of St. Paul for their ongoing financial support of this valuable program for the 2023-24 school year.

The Division wishes to express gratitude to staff for their efforts in making Christmas concerts a memorable experience. Dates and times of school concerts are available <u>here</u>. As we prepare for the Christmas break, schools are also working to ensure students and families are aware of the supports available over the holidays. The new year brings new opportunities to speak to your kids about the harmful effects of smoking and vaping.

Tobacco products put people at risk for many diseases. All tobacco products have many chemicals that are harmful to your lungs and nearly every organ in the body. Nicotine comes from tobacco and presents many harmful effects to physical and emotional health.

Quitting all forms of tobacco and nicotine is the best choice you can make for your health.

Nicotine Products

With the rise in electronic cigarettes, vape pens, hookahs and smokeless tobacco, there are more ways than ever for youth to get hooked on nicotine. And kids are more likely to see these smoke-free alternatives as a cooler and safer way to smoke. Parents should pay attention to an unusual attachment to a USB stick, sharpie, pen, lipstick, key fob, etc. These items may be a type of e-cigarette disguised as everyday items.

Talk to Youth About Smoking & Vaping

Talk to your kids about smoking and vaping early, even as young as age 10.

Know the facts so you can discuss the health risks and nicotine addiction.

Focus on the short-term effects of nicotine use: it can change the way your brain works, may make it harder to breathe and it costs a lot of money. Youth are the target of big companies looking for lifelong customers.

Calmly correct misconceptions and take time to listen.

Talking to Youth Matters

Research shows that youth who learn about drug risks from their parents are less likely to start using them. If you don't talk about it, your child may think it's okay to smoke or vape.

Youth who choose not to use substances are **less** likely to:

- Have serious trouble in school
- Get hurt in a car accident
- Be a victim of crime
- Have substance use problems as an adult


